Twelfth Annual Hindu Mandir Executives Conference (HMEC) – 2017

The twelfth HMEC was held in Indianapolis, Indiana at the Waterfront Hotel from September 15 to 17, 2017. In the past 11 years, averages of 100+ temples have participated across North America and Caribbean in HMEC. The conference sessions were well received by delegates from USA, Canada and India.

This year, there were over 30 Grand Hosts and Co-Hosts of the conference mainly from USA and Canada. Some 200 adult and youth delegates drawn from over 60 organizations and 3 countries participated in the conference.

The theme for the conference was: "Hindu Temples and Institutions: Challenges of the 21st Century." Hindu temples and institutions are facing challenges around the globe as technology and social changes affect traditional beliefs and practices. The 12th annual HMEC conference enabled Hindu leaders to look at these trends affecting their institutions and rise to the challenges presented by the digital age in the areas of temple management, religious programs, youth engagement, serving seniors and society.

In the inaugural session on Friday, 15 September, Swamini Svatmavidyananda Saraswati of Arsha Vijnana Gurukulam provided blessings and painted a vision for HMEC. Dr. Vijay Reddy warmly welcomed the conference attendees to Indianapolis on behalf of the host team. Next, Dr. Raman Khanna from Hindu American Foundation presented a perspective on Hindu Activism highlighting the theme of 'Who Controls the Past, Controls the Future.' In his inaugural address, Swami Pratyagbodhananda of Arsha Vidya Gurukulam inspired all with a call to action to face the 'Challenges of the 21st Century.' The session ended with blessings from Acharya Dharmendra Sharma, who came from New Delhi to attend HMEC.

The plenary sessions on Saturday, 16 September, set the stage for the rest of the conference. Sessions addressed key challenges through a great line up of speakers: Temple & Institutions of the Future, Fulfilling Our Hopes and Needs, Youth, Young Adult Engagement and Seva As An Inter-Generational Bridge.

Since its inception, HMEC has bred many worthwhile projects and initiatives. A summary was presented to share progress with the audience. Among them are: HMPC (Hindu Mandir Priest Conference), WHC (World Hindu Congress), HAVAN (Hindu American Vanaprasthi Network), Publication of Sanskar books, Gita Distribution and HMEC Alignment with National Services promoting chaplaincy. The session was closed with an update from Sanjay Mehta, Secretary of VHP America, highlighting the achievements of HMEC thus far and encouraging all to continue on this journey to network, share and stand together.

During the afternoon parallel tracks, a series of workshops were organized by a professional set of workshop leads with the intention to drive towards tangible outputs following the workshop. Prior to the workshop, these leads started forming committees to brainstorm and create a workshop out line that would simplify the objectives of the outputs towards an achievable deadline.

Additionally, there were three workshop sessions for the Youth and Young Adults, designed and conducted by the Young Adults: Hinduism, Social Challenges and Other Questions of Today, Shaastras/Spiritual Content Distribution for Millennials, Digital Guide for Mandirs.

As an output of this workshop series, the youth and young adult workshop leads intend to release a Digital Guide for Mandirs in the next couple of months.
