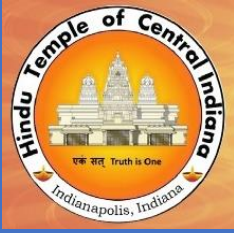

Eligibility Criteria for NSGP Grant

Must meet the description under section 501©(3) of the internal revenue Code and be exempt from tax under section 501(a) of such code.

Must be a non-for-profit organization

Be able to demonstrate through the application that the organization is at high risk of a terrorist attack

Should have a Unique Entity Identification (UEI) Number

Grant is issued by U.S Department of Homeland Security (DHS), Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), Grant Programs Directorate (GPD)



NSGP Program Overview, Objectives and Priorities

- Overview

- Is one of the three grant programs by the Department of Homeland Security (DHS), Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), focusing on enhancing the ability of state, local, tribal and territorial governments, as well as nonprofits, to prevent, protect against, respond to and recover from terrorist attacks.
- NSGP supports the goal to Strengthen National Preparedness and resilience.
- The NSGP supports the goals of Building a Culture of Preparedness and Readyng the Nation for Catastrophic Disasters.
- \$250 Million Available in 2022

- Objectives

- NSGP provides funding for physical security enhancement and other security-related activities to nonprofit organizations that are at high risk
- The NSGP also seeks to integrate the preparedness activities of nonprofit organizations with broader state and local preparedness efforts.

- Priorities

- Enhancing the protection of soft targets/crowded places
- Second tier priorities that help recipients implement a comprehensive approach to securing communities
 - Effective planning
 - Training and awareness campaigns
 - Exercises

NSGP: Federal Award Information

- NSGP-Maximum Award
 - \$150,000 (As of 2022)
- Deadline for Application submission
 - Application Start Date: February of the calendar year
 - Application Submission Deadline: April of the Calendar year
- Anticipated Funding Selection date
 - No later than July 1st of the calendar year
- Anticipated Award date
 - No later than Sept 30th if calendar year
- Period of Performance
 - 36 months
 - Extensions to the period of performance are allowed
- Projected period of Performance Start Date(s)
 - September of the Calendar year
- Projected Period Performance End Date(s)
 - August of 3rd calendar year
- Funding Instrument Type
 - Grant

2. Background (possible points 2 of 40)

1. Describe the symbolic value of the site as a significant institution within the community that renders the site as a possible target of terrorism

3. Risks (12 possible points out of 40)

1. Threats
2. Vulnerabilities
3. Potential Consequences of an attack

4. Target Hardening (14 possible points out of 40)

1. Describe each proposed activity or investment and the identified threat or vulnerability that it addresses as well as the associated cost with each activity or investment

5. Milestones (4 possible points out of 40)

1. Description and associated key activities that lead to the milestone event over the NSGP period of performance

6. Project Management (3 possible points out of 40)

7. Impact (5 possible points out of 40)

1. What measurable outputs and outcomes will indicate that this investment is successful at the end of the period of performance

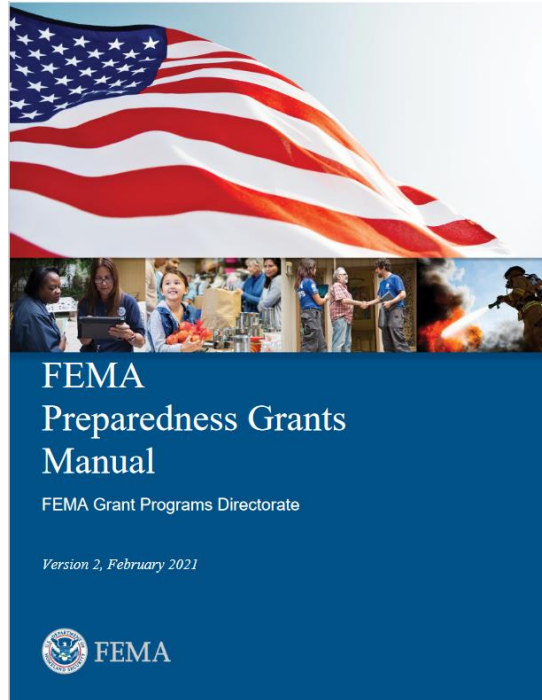


Nonprofit Security Grant Program
